When we received our charitable status in 2009, none of us could have imagined where we would be today. Looking back at how far Green Wood Coalition has come in 10 years, we are humbled by what we have achieved and hopeful for what lies ahead.

In a perfect world, we would not exist. Everyone would have what they need. But our world is imperfect. And through this imperfection we, at Green Wood Coalition, have found our space. We are here because government systems continue to struggle to meet the social and health care needs of our most vulnerable neighbours. Whether through a smile, a chat, an art session, a meal or just sharing a cup of coffee, we connect with individuals struggling with trauma, hunger, housing insecurity and loneliness, people aching for a sense of community and belonging. These connections give our work meaning. These connections enrich our lives.

As we share our stories, offer help and bear witness to these struggles, the role we can play in strengthening individuals and our community is shaped. Our mantra, Everyone Has a Story, is truly part of our core. Stories connect us, bind us and motivate us to find solutions to lift up one human being at a time.

At this 10-year milestone, we ask ourselves, what will the world look like 10 years from now? Will we be more caring and compassionate? Will we have learned that only by looking after one another can we live as a truly inclusive community where no one is left behind?

Our fervent hope is that the answer is yes, but should we fall short, Green Wood Coalition will still be here.

Green Wood Coalition Celebrates 10 Years, 10 Moments of Change


There are moments that define us. Moments that, had they passed unnoticed, we might have missed seeing, hearing, learning, sharing, or creating something amazing. In our 10 short years, we have had some pivotal moments. Our 10 major highlights demonstrate our impact in our community.

- 1. Wednesday nights we serve home cooked dinners, gathered collectively around the table. In 2006, we sat down to our first Community Dinner, served by a small group of citizens who saw the desperation of their neighbours. Today 80-100 people break bread together weekly, supported by over a dozen community partners providing beautiful meals.
- 2. The struggle of those living in makeshift tents, abandoned buildings or couch surfing drives our Street Level Outreach. We listen and form relationships. Over the years, we've made a difference in the lives of hundreds of individuals, helping them to navigate the system and forge connections to health services, income supports and a caring community.
- 3. The role of Advocacy follows naturally from the needs we witness in our community. We challenge local policy and thinking on issues such as homelessness and health care, seeking to influence broader local change. We focus on creating awareness, educating and standing up for equity and basic human dignity for all of our neighbours.
- 4. We have seen people emerge from years of darkness and move toward a healthier, more engaged way of life through our RedPath Addiction Recovery Program. Since 2017, partnering with PARN and others, Harm Reduction has been an important part of our work, saving lives while people consider alternative solutions.
- 5. WrapAround life planning forms a circle of support around those with complex needs. The individual is at the centre of decision-making about their life, supported by a team of community members they choose. Since 2013 we have


trained 18 WrapAround facilitators in various local agencies and helped over 30 households move closer to the life they desire.

- 6. Community Partnerships are a vital part of our story. From the first gathering of friends, which launched our community dinners, to present, we've developed close to 50 working relationships with health and social service agencies, churches, service clubs and fellow non-profits. We continue to grow and remain relevant because of their continued support.
- 7. Since 2015 Community 101 has provided a platform for ideas, education, and community building. With the help of partners like Northumberland United Way, we've hosted leaders in the fields of health, social justice and community development, stimulating inspiring and interactive discussions.
- 8. Making art and working in a garden help us to heal. Over the past 10 years, our Art Hive and Community Garden have offered safe spaces for creativity, contemplation and connection. Whether through planting seeds or exploring artistic expression, dozens have been nourished on many levels.
- 9. Fundraising events bring people together in meaningful ways, from film screenings and pie baking contests to the Walk the Line concerts. Since 2016, Coldest Night of the Year has become our most important fundraiser. The annual event has raised nearly \$200,000 to support those facing poverty, hunger and homelessness in Northumberland County.
- 10. IMAGINATE harnesses the power of the arts and advocacy to raise awareness of the most urgent social issues of our time. Prominent social justice advocates, artists and community leaders have taken to the podium at the annual conference and Evening of Possibility to inform, entertain and motivate more than 1,000 attendees over the years.
